Welcome to the 2025 edition of Expat Insider!

Conducted annually since 2014, our survey aims to shine a light on expat life around the globe. That's why every February, we ask our members to share their personal experience. They rate up to 53 different factors describing the living (and working) conditions in their current place of residence. Every country with at least 50 respondents makes it into our analysis, which is the basis for the different rankings and country spotlights you'll find in this report.

It's been rewarding to see public interest in our survey results grow. Every year, the number of interested readers and media features increases, and journalists, researchers, and governments alike reach out to us for more information. As the biggest and best established of its kind, our survey serves as a mirror of global developments and provides unique insights in times of increasingly mobile work forces, shifting employment markets, and skilled labor shortages around the globe.

Economic and financial uncertainty are topics that have had an influence on our country rankings in recent years. Political and economic developments are always reflected in our results on a country or regional level. When looking at the bigger picture — how individual countries fare in relation to others across the different indices of our survey — we can see global trends emerging.

One trend that's become apparent over the past three years is the importance of personal

finances. Increasingly, countries that perform well in our Personal Finance Index are also at the top of our overall ranking of the Best & Worst Destinations for Expats. This year, only the UAE and Cyprus are among the 15 best destinations that aren't also represented in the top 15 of our Personal Finance Index (though it's a close call with Cyprus in 16th place in the index).

Interestingly, with the exception of Saudi Arabia, all countries that feature in the top 15 of the Personal Finance Index 2025 are also where expats report the highest general happiness level. Looking back at 2022, this overlap was only around 50%. And five of the 15 best expat destinations back then showed a mediocre to bad performance in the Personal Finance Index. This indicates financial considerations have gained relevance, playing a more important role in how expats rate other aspects of life in their host country.

Returning to 2025, we also see a high degree of overlap in the top 15 when it comes to happiness and the Ease of Settling In Index — the ranking that looks at how welcome expats feel in their host country.

Our other indices, however, show a different picture. The top of both the Working Abroad and Quality of Life Indices are dominated by Europe, which is represented by eight countries in the top 15 of each index. For reference, the top 15 of the Personal Finance and the Ease of Settling In Indices feature two and three European countries, respectively. Meanwhile, the Expat Essentials Index is a mixed bag, as many countries that do well for its Digital Life and Admin Topics Subcategories find themselves in the lower half of the Housing and Language Subcategories, and vice versa.

What conclusions can we draw from this? If nothing else, this brief analysis shows expats

haven't been left untouched by the effects of high inflation and widespread economic pessimism. Good infrastructure in all areas of public life remains essential, but if you have to pay through your nose or are put in a position where you compete with the local population to access it, where does this leave us?

The pages of this report hold many more insights: data to be explored, questions to be asked, and trends waiting to be uncovered. I invite you to explore it all in detail. We'll be back next year — let's see what the future brings.

How happy are you with your life abroad in general?

Short Methodology

The Expat Insider 2025 survey was conducted by InterNations from 1 to 28 February 2025. The online questionnaire was promoted through the InterNations community as well as the company newsletter and social media profiles, but responses were not limited to InterNations members.

The target audience included all kinds of expats, from foreign assignees (i.e., employees sent on a corporate assignment abroad) and international retirees to self-made expats who looked for work abroad and others who moved for a variety of reasons. A total of 10,085 expats participated in the survey, representing 172 nationalities living in countries or territories worldwide.

For a country to be listed in any of the indices and in the overall ranking, a sample size of at least 50 survey participants per destination is required. In 2025, 46 destinations met this requirement.

The results are published in the form of an overall ranking of popular expat destinations, with additional information on five topical indices: Working Abroad, Personal Finance, Quality of Life, Expat Essentials, and Ease of Settling In.

Survey participants were asked to rate up to 53 factors related to expat life on a scale of one to seven. The survey emphasized personal satisfaction with these factors and considers both factual (e.g., housing costs) and emotional (e.g., feeling at home) aspects with equal weight.

The individual factor ratings were grouped into 16 subcategories, which were then used to draw up

the five topical indices mentioned above. These five indices, plus responses to the question "All things considered, how happy are you with your life abroad in general?", were averaged to arrive at the overall country ranking.

Please keep in mind:

The ratings compare the survey participants' individual satisfaction with various factors, instead of looking at related facts from external sources. For example, "personal safety" is a measure of how safe expats *feel* in their respective destination, not actual crime rate statistics.

The indices don't cover every potential aspect of living abroad (e.g., international schools/education) nor are the results meant to be an endorsement of any specific destination. It's rather a comparison of how expats rate their everyday life abroad based on subjective scores.

All percentages have been rounded to full integral numbers. In some cases, this may lead to responses to one question adding up to 99% or 101%. These instances are simply due to rounding and aren't based on erroneous data.



The Best & Worst Countries for Expats in 2025

Familiar faces show up in the top and bottom 3 of the 2025 Expat Insider survey, though one country surprises with its drop in performance.

1st for the Second Year in a Row: Panama

In the 2025 Expat Insider survey, **Panama** (1st) holds on to its crown. All of its five indices place in the top 3, and a whopping 94% of expats there are happy with their life abroad.

Everything is very relaxed, and Panamanians are very friendly. I feel safe in this country.

Panama is the place to be for retirees: 35% of respondents are already retired (vs. 11% globally), and 18% say their primary motivation for moving was to retire there (vs. 3%). And Panama doesn't disappoint in terms of Quality of Life, placing 3rd. There's plenty of opportunities to travel (3rd), public transportation is

affordable (5th), and the natural environment is stellar (2nd). There're also plenty of options for dining (8th) and recreational sport (4th).

Before moving to Panama, 26% of expats said they had no concerns (vs. 16% globally). Once there, they find the availability of green goods and services (32nd), infrastructure for cars (30th), and the availability of administrative or government

services online (30th) to be poor — minor concerns for expats who are the happiest across the survey with their life abroad in Panama (1st). And in fact, more than a third (35%) plan to stay forever (vs. 24% globally).

Such a decision is unsurprising, with friendly locals and a welcoming culture (Ease of Settling In 2nd) as well as a comfortable life with the disposable income available to expats who are overall satisfied with their financial situation (Personal Finance 3rd).

Handling the Expat Essentials — from visas to housing — is hardly an issue (Panama ranks 2nd in the index). And for the ones not yet retired, the country offers an amazing experience Working Abroad (1st).

Your Money Takes You Far Colombia (2nd)

From 5th in 2024, Colombia now ranks 2nd out of 46 destinations in 2025. Personal Finance (2nd) is the best-performing index, with the low cost of living (3rd) a big plus for expats: 81% are satisfied with their financial situation in Colombia (vs. 54% globally).

However, financial reasons weren't the main draw for

expats to relocate. Instead, the same share of expats (17%) cited a better quality of life (vs. 7% globally); love (vs. 9%); and jobrelated reasons (vs. 36%). Regarding the latter, the share is almost 20 percentage points lower than the global average; in fact, more than half of respondents in Colombia (57%) aren't doing any paid work for one reason or another (vs. 30%

globally). And yet, 92% of respondents say their disposable household income is enough to lead a comfortable life (vs. 69%).

In addition to good finances, expats in Colombia are happy with their social lives and feel at home among friendly locals (Ease of Settling In 3rd). Importantly, housing is affordable (2nd) and easy to find (5th). However, there's a lack of availability of government services online (41st), and it isn't easy getting by without speaking Spanish (39th). This varying performance in factors places the Expat Essentials Index 9th.

One major concern prior to their move — cited by 43% of respondents — is the lack of safety and security (vs. 7% globally). It's a tangible concern, as the Safety & Security Subcategory ranks in the bottom 10 (39th). A quarter of expats in Colombia (25%) view their personal safety negatively (vs. 9% globally), and an even higher share (40%) say the political situation is unstable (vs. 18%). This places the Quality of Life Index in 18th, despite abundant Leisure Options (7th) and good Healthcare (9th).

A Welcoming Local Culture in Mexico (3rd)

Rounding up the top 3 is **Mexico**. Three of its indices — Ease of Settling In (1st), Expat Essentials (7th), and Personal Finances (8th) — can be found in the top 10.

Since 2014, Mexico has consistently placed in the top 3 of the Ease of Settling In Index. Expats find it easy to get used to the local culture (1st) and make local friends (1st), with 35% describing their friends

and acquaintances as mostly locals

— more than double the global average of 16%. It's unsurprising expats feel both welcome (2nd) and at home (2nd) there.

Despite a great social life, the Quality of Life is just average (23rd). Most of the heavy lifting is

done by the Leisure Options (2nd) and Healthcare

(19th) Subcategories, while Travel & Transit (31st), Safety & Security (33rd), and Environment & Climate (35th) linger close to the bottom 10. Although the weather is great (8th), the air quality is poor (39th). Personal safety is also an issue (39th); similarly to Colombia, a higher share than the global average cited the lack of safety and security as their biggest concern before moving to Mexico (29% vs. 7% globally).

So why do expats move to Mexico? The most cited reasons are job related (24% vs. 36% globally), followed by a better quality of life (17% vs. 7%). Expats appreciate their personal career opportunities (8th) and work-life balance (8th) but are unhappy with their working hours (31st) and job security (27th). Overall, 67% of respondents are satisfied with their jobs (vs. 60% globally). This lands the Working Abroad Index in above-average 14th place.

But like Panama and Colombia, there's a higher share of expats in Mexico that are already retired compared to the global average (31% vs. 11%). Satisfaction with their financial situation (3rd) could play a part in why 39% of respondents plan to stay forever in Mexico (vs. 24% globally).

An Insular Society in Kuwait (46th)

No stranger to last place is Kuwait in 46th. Not only are the Quality of Life and Ease of Settling In Indices also in last place, but so is expats' overall happiness with their life in Kuwait (46th). And at 10 percentage points higher than the global average, 17% of expats plan to leave the country within a year.

The majority of respondents (70%) moved to Kuwait for job-related reasons (vs. 36% globally); in fact, 93% are working full time (vs. 56% globally). Yet the Working Abroad Index is in the bottom 10 (38th). Although the state of the economy is strong

(8th), expats aren't satisfied with their job security (45th) or work-life balance (44th) and don't agree that they're paid fairly for their work (44th).

Indeed, 38% of expats in Kuwait don't feel their disposable household income is enough to lead a comfortable life (vs. 31% globally). And around the same share as the global average is satisfied with their financial situation (56% vs. 54%). So although Personal Finance is Kuwait's best-performing index, it's in a below-average 29th place.

Expats' biggest concern before moving was the climate & weather (43% vs. 16% globally). Once there, about half (49%) give this factor a negative

rating. And there's no pleasant natural environment (46th), urban environment (42nd), or good air quality (44th) to distract from the desert heat. Other areas of the Quality of Life similarly disappoint with the lack of culture & nightlife (46th), public transportation (39th), and opportunity to travel (42nd). The availability of healthcare (26th) and

the dining options (24th) are at least less dire.

Though expats may have to contend with dining out alone as it's difficult to build a social life in Kuwait. The Ease of Settling In Index places last thanks in part to the perceived unfriendliness of locals in general (46th) and towards foreign residents (46th), as well as the difficulty getting used to the local culture (44th).

A Fearsome Language Barrier in Türkiye (45th)

Like Kuwait, **Türkiye** (45th) is no stranger to the bottom 10. Except for Ease of Settling In, every index can also be found in the bottom 10. About a quarter of expats in Türkiye (26%) are unhappy with their life abroad (vs. 15% globally), and a similar share (23%) is planning to leave as soon as possible to within a year (vs. 11%).

Although the Ease of Settling In (32nd) is the best-performing index, expats struggle with feeling at home in Türkiye (37th) and find the locals to be unfriendly towards foreigners (34th). Nevertheless, the best-performing factor across the index is making local friends: 42% of respondents say it's easy (vs. 38% globally). Interestingly, the second-most cited concern before moving to Türkiye was loneliness/isolation (22% vs. 24%).

And the most cited? The language barrier (54% vs. 32% globally). Indeed, about half of expats (48%) say it's difficult to get by without speaking Turkish (vs. 34%). This could be one reason why it's difficult to deal with the local bureaucracy/

authorities (39th), find housing (36th), or open a local bank account (37th). Additional poor performance of factors across the index ranks Expat Essentials second-to-last (45th).

Another index in 45th place is Working Abroad, with all four of its subcategories in the bottom 10. About a third of respondents (31%) moved to Türkiye for job-related reasons (vs. 36% globally), yet a similar share (32%) doesn't agree that moving improved their career prospects (vs. 22%). Expats find the state of the economy to be poor (46th) and are dissatisfied with their working hours (45th), job security (42nd),

The Quality of Life (41st) is in a similar position — expats are unsatisfied with being unable to openly express themselves and their opinions (45th); the political stability (43rd); and equal access to all kinds of healthcare services (39th). The silver lining: Türkiye has great weather (10th) and good availability of public transportation (18th).

and job in general (44th).

South Korea (44th) Loses Big in the Ranking

In a stunning display of how fortunes change,

South Korea tumbles from 23rd in 2024 to rank 44th out of 46 countries in 2025. All indices drop into the bottom 10, except for Quality of Life which instead loses its placement in the top 10. The recent political upheaval and economic turbulence in 2024 can soak up the blame,1 but it doesn't change the fact that expats are unhappy with their life in South Korea (42nd).

Still holding on are the Travel & Transit (12th) and Healthcare (15th) Subcategories of the Quality of Life Index (32nd). Nevertheless, the affordability of both transportation and medical care has taken a hit. And while expats feel safe in the country (7th), their view on political stability has expectedly worsened (40th).

South Korea's Working Abroad Index is in the bottom 10, as are its four underlying subcategories. It's the worst-performing country (46th) for personal career opportunities, working

> hours, work-life balance, fair pay for work, and general job satisfaction. For the 80% of respondents doing paid work, things could certainly

be better.

A leading concern for expats prior to their move to South Korea is language barrier (58% vs.

32% globally). Not speaking Korean could lock job seekers out of the local job market, which is negatively rated by 54% of expats. A high share of respondents (41%) work in the education field, including language education (vs. 11%) — the next most popular field is finance at only 11% of the share.

The language barrier also has knock-on effects on the Expat Essentials Index (44th). It could partly explain why expats find it difficult to open a local bank account (41st), find housing (38th), and deal with the local bureaucracy/authorities (36th). Indeed, more than half of respondents (53%) say it's difficult to live in South Korea without speaking Korean (vs. 34% globally).

There's an obsession with social standing, and an expectation to work very long hours.

There hasn't been much change to the top 10 in 2025 — **China** (6th) and **Malaysia** (10th) are the only new arrivals. Together with **Thailand** (4th), **Vietnam** (5th), and **Indonesia** (8th), this means Asian countries dominate half of the list.

One thing that unites expats in these five countries is their satisfaction with Personal Finance, with the countries ranking in the top 10 of the index (from Vietnam's 1st place to Malaysia's 9th). Another great aspect is Housing: expats find it both affordable and easy to find. In fact, China's 11th place in the Housing Subcategory is the "worst" result here. What varies the most, however, is the Quality of Life Index, from China's 6th place to Indonesia's 40th. But one thing's for sure, expats won't run out of culinary and dining options, as all five countries rank in the top 10 for this factor.

Overall, expats living in these countries rank their happiness in the top 10, with the exception of Malaysia in 15th.

The top three positions are occupied by the Latin American countries **Panama** (1st), **Colombia** (2nd), and **Mexico** (3rd). Their commonality is a friendly and welcoming culture, with no shortage of a social life as indicated by a stellar Ease of Settling In Index: all its underlying subcategories and factors rank in the top 5; only Panama's Local Friendliness sees 6th place. They're also hotspots for retirees, with a high share of expats (25% or more vs. a global 11%) saying they're already retired.

The **UAE** (7th) and **Spain** (9th) are geographically the odd ones out. Although they occupy the top two positions in the Quality of Life Index, they begin to diverge when it comes to Expat Essentials (UAE 1st, Spain 23rd) and Working Abroad (5th, 27th). It's not all smooth sailing for the UAE as expats are unsatisfied with their disposable household income (38th vs. Spain's 18th) and rank their happiness with their life abroad (17th) lower than expats in Spain (4th).

Similar to the top 10, there are only two new additions to the bottom 10 this year: **Sweden** slips a few spots to 38th place, while **South Korea** takes a major tumble of 21 places to rank 44th.

More than half of the bottom 10 is occupied by European countries: Italy (37th), Sweden (38th), Norway (39th), United Kingdom (41st), Germany (42nd), and Finland (43rd). Right off the bat, expats rank these countries in the bottom 10 when it comes to their happiness with their lives abroad — except for Italy, which is in a below-average 26th place.

Reasons for their unhappiness vary. For instance, while the three Nordic countries offer a great Environment & Climate (top 10 ranking), expats struggle with the Ease of Settling In (bottom 10). In Expat Essentials Index, expats in Italy and Germany have a difficult time with Digital Life (Italy 40th, Germany 46th) and Admin Topics (46th, 42nd) in particular. Meanwhile, this index is the United Kingdom's best performing one (24th). But

expats there struggle with their Personal Finance (45th) as well as housing (41st) and medical (44th) costs.

South Korea (44th), **Türkiye** (45th), and **Kuwait** (46th) make up the bottom 3. Expats are in agreement that working in these countries is tough, with all three ranking in the bottom 10 of the Working Abroad Index (as well as the bottom 3 spots for Work Culture & Satisfaction).

Last but not least, **Canada** (40th) features in the bottom 10 for the second year in a row. One major gripe of expats there? Finances. Whether it's costs of public transportation (38th), housing (40th), or living (44th), settling in Canada is expensive.

The Biggest Winners & Losers in 2025

All but one of the biggest winners in the 2025 overall expat ranking can be found in Europe, with only China beating the trend. And another Asian destination is the biggest loser by a wide margin.

Island Life Delights in Cyprus & Malta

The two biggest winners in the 2025 Expat Insider survey are both island states in the Mediterranean Sea: **Cyprus** (+22 in the overall ranking) and **Malta** (+20).

Both have made noticeable gains when it comes to Working Abroad. Cyprus finally left the bottom 10 to rank 31st in the index, while Malta rose 18 spots to place 16th in 2025.

The reasons for this development are many. The share of expats dissatisfied with their work-life balance in Malta, for example, has more than halved (29% in 2024 vs. 13% in 2025), and two-thirds (67%) now agree they're paid fairly for their work, compared to just around half (52%) the previous year. In Cyprus, meanwhile, its strong economic growth in 2024¹ might be behind expats' improved opinions on job security (from 40% positive ratings in 2024 to 52% in 2025), the local job market (from 30% to 42%), and their personal career opportunities (from 27% to 52%).

Malta, too, has seen economic growth and a slowing inflation rate that's further helped by governmental measures to keep energy prices stable. 2 It now ranks 21st in the Personal Finance Index (vs. 36th place in 2024).

In Cyprus, the share of respondents who find their disposable household income is *not* enough to lead a comfortable life has dropped from 39% to 26%. In fact, Cyprus made its biggest improvements in the Personal Finance Index, ranking 16th in 2025 after placing 38th a year earlier.

While these two indices are where Cyprus and Malta made the most gains, their results also improved — to a lesser degree — across other areas of the survey. For example, Cyprus rises 14 places in the Quality of Life Index to rank 19th in 2025, thanks in large part to better Leisure Options (+26). And in Malta, an easier housing search (+24), among other things, means the country leaves the bottom 10 of the Expat Essentials Index behind to rank 32nd (vs. 48th in 2024).

An Improved Quality of Life in Czechia

With **Czechia**, a third European destination is among the three biggest winners in 2025. Up 18

ranks, the country places 21st in 2025.

Czechia offers a good quality of life, career prospects, and safety.

Afteryears of getting close, Czechia finally makes it into the top 10 of the Quality of Life Index, ranking 8th. This isn't down to major changes for one or two of the underlying

factors of the index. Rather, Czechia has made small to moderate gains for most, which add up to this improved result.

In the Expat Essentials Index (+10), Czechia's jump in the Digital Life Subcategory stands out (from

37th in 2024 to 21st in 2025). Expats are more likely to approve of the availability of online government/admin services and agree it's easy to get high-speed internet set up at home — both factors see a 10-percentage-point increase in positive ratings.

Over a third of respondents continue to regard the local population to be somewhat unfriendly (35% both years), and Czechia's 37th place in the Ease of Settling In Index isn't something to write home about. Still, results have improved when it comes to expats' social life (from 50% positive ratings in 2024 to 59%) and how easy they find it to make local friends (from 22% to 30%).

Work a Continued Highlight in Ireland

There are some bad results that **Ireland** just can't seem to shake: a bottom 3 result for Healthcare (45th out of 46 in 2025), last place for Housing (46th), and expats' dissatisfaction with the climate & weather (42nd). Still, the country managed to climb 17 spots to place 28th overall.

Up 11 places, Ireland's Ease of Settling In Index

(18th) is firmly above average. Expats consider the Irish to be friendly (from 71% to 81% in 2025) and are less likely to say they don't feel at home in the country (from 30% negative responses in 2024 to 19%).

Working Abroad has long been an area where Ireland received its best results. And indeed, following a dip in 2024 (11th), the country makes it back into the

top 3 in 2025 to rank 2nd. Find out more in Top Prospects, Good Hours & More: Countries for Your Career (pp. 47–56).

What stands out: In 2024, over a third of working expats (35%) disagreed that their pay was fair, based on their industry, qualifications, and such. In 2025,

this share is down to 16%. And while an average 61% of expats already appreciated their work-life balance in 2024, this share has gone up to an above-average 72%. This development might be related to the introduction of a new code of practice in March 2024, which gives employees the legal right to request remote working arrangements — even if employers can still say no.³

Better Careers in China

China, the only non-European country among the biggest winners, jumped from 19th place into the top 10 of 2025, ranking 6th.

Like Ireland, China made gains in the Working Abroad Index, where it's up 21 places to rank 9th in 2025. Expats continue to appreciate the fair pay (2nd) and their personal career opportunities (5th). Plus, general job satisfaction has grown (from 68% to 76%).

One possible explanation for this: expats in China are much more satisfied with their working hours (65% positive ratings in 2025 vs. 54% in 2024), which interestingly have also gone down. Respondents working full time in China report an average 41.4-hour week in 2025. In 2024, this

number was much higher at 43.7 hours — while the global average hasn't changed (42.5 h per week).

China also cinched a top 10 place in the Quality of Life Index: it ranks 6th in 2025, following 19th place in 2024. Results have improved for nearly every single factor of the index and most noticeably when it comes

to the Safety & Security (from 35th to 17th in 2025) and Leisure Options (25th to 5th) Subcategories.

China's gains in the Personal Finance Index were not as drastic but still worth mentioning: it further improves on its 10th place of 2024 to rank 4th in 2025. Only 6% of expats find their disposable household income is *not* enough to

lead a comfortable life. In 2024, this share was three times as high (18%).

The Biggest Loser: South Korea

Ranking 44th out of 46 countries, **South Korea** sees a major fall in the 2025 Expat Insider survey: a year earlier, it still placed 23rd out of 53 destinations. With this 21-spot drop, it's by far the biggest loser in the survey. Runner-up Brazil "only" fell 8 places.

The reasons for South Korea's worsened results can't be pinned down to just one area of the survey. Even in indices like the Ease of Settling In, where the change in rank may not seem like much (from 36th in 2024 to 38th in 2025), expats' regard for some of the underlying factors has worsened. For instance, the share of respondents who feel welcome there has dropped by 15 percentage points (2024: 58%; 2025: 43%). And while close to two-thirds (64%) rated the general friendliness of the South Korean population positively in 2024, this is down to 48% in 2025.

The most drastic change, however, occurred in the Personal Finance Index: following a good 15th place in 2024, South Korea finds itself in the bottom 10 a year later, ranking 40th. Especially expats' satisfaction with their personal finances took a hit (from 11th to

Usually one of South Korea's strong points, the Quality of Life Index worsened as well, with the country going from 10th to 32nd place within one year. Expats still appreciate the availability (9th) and affordability (12th) of public transportation, but the recent political crisis⁴ and upheavals in the healthcare system⁵ have clearly left their mark (see Where Expats Can Find the Best Quality of Life (& Where Not), pp. 22–33).

The Working Abroad and Expat Essentials Indices were hardly a highlight of life in South Korea lately. But results slipped even further in 2025, with the country now in the bottom 3 for both, ranking 46th and 44th, respectively. That means it's the worst-performing country for working abroad! Where Expats Can Find the Best Quality of Life (& Where Not)

European destinations make up the majority of the top 10, but a great quality of life can also be found elsewhere. And one country in particular has fallen far in the ranking.

Methodology

The Quality of Life Index consists of five subcategories with three to six underlying factors each.

The **Safety & Security** Subcategory summarizes respondents' opinions on their personal safety; the political stability; and whether they feel they can openly express themselves and their opinions in their host country.

The **Healthcare** Subcategory looks into the affordability, availability, and quality of medical care as well as how easy it is to get equal access to all kinds of healthcare services.

The culture & nightlife offering; the culinary variety & dining options; and the local opportunities for recreational sports form the **Leisure Options** Subcategory.

The **Travel & Transit** Subcategory sums up the affordabilityandavailabilityofpublictransportation; the opportunity to travel; the infrastructure for cars; and whether it's easy and safe to get around on foot or by bicycle.

Lastly, the **Environment & Climate** Subcategory is about expats' satisfaction with the host country's natural environment; urban environment; air quality; and climate & weather. It also considers how expats rate the availability of green goods and services (e.g., renewable energy, organic food) and whether the government supports policies to protect the environment.

Expats rated these factors on a scale of one (very bad / disagree completely) to seven (very good / agree completely). For a country to be featured in the ranking, it required a minimum of 50 respondents. In 2025, 46 destinations met this threshold.

Happy & Healthy in Spain (1st)

Spain ranks 1st in the Quality of Life Index — an ongoing trend since 2022. So, it's hardly surprising that large shares of expats move there for a better quality of life (20% vs. 7% globally) or to retire abroad (8% vs. 3%). And in fact, most expats (84%) are happy with their life in Spain (vs. 67% globally).

(83% positive ratings vs. 59% globally), easily available (82% vs. 68%), and of high quality (81% vs. 67%).

Public transportation is another plus, with expats giving Spain good grades for its affordability (9th) and availability (14th). It's safe and easy to get around on foot or by bike, too, according to 87% of

respondents (vs. 77% globally). Plus, there's plenty of opportunity to travel (7th).

Reviews for the Safety & Security Subcategory (14th) aren't quite as glowing. Expats agree they feel safe (87% vs. 81% globally) and can openly express themselves and their opinions (77% vs. 63%). However, results for Spain's political stability are only average (57% positive vs. 56% globally).

Safe & Sound in the UAE (2nd)

Since placing 5th in 2022, the **UAE** has steadily climbed up a spot each year to now rank 2nd in the 2025 Quality of Life Index.

Personal safety is a huge highlight (1st), and close to nine in ten respondents (87%) rate the country's political stability positively (vs. 56% globally). Healthcare, meanwhile, is readily available (6th) and of high quality (3rd), but costs can be an issue (25th).

Around four in five expats praise the culinary variety & dining options (83% vs. 74%) and the culture & nightlife (78% vs. 66%), but recreational sporting opportunities aren't as abundant (21st).

Maybe outdoor sports are what's missing? The UAE receives one of its worst results for the natural environment, placing 42nd out of 46 destinations. But thanks to a good availability of green goods and services (8th) and a government that, according to expats, supports policies to protect the environment (1st), even the UAE's worst-performing subcategory in the index receives an above-average result: 20th for Environment & Climate.

Plenty to Do & See in Panama (3rd)

Panama's 3rd place in the 2025 Quality of Life Index is a major step up: in 2024, it still ranked 16th out of 53 destinations.

Results have improved across all subcategories of the index except for Healthcare (14th vs. 15th place in 2024). Expats continue to appreciate the quality (14th) and availability (12th) of medical care in Panama, though less so its affordability (22nd).

Leisure Options (3rd) are among the best thanks to the available sporting opportunities (4th) and culture & nightlife (8th). Plus, 83% of respondents rate the culinary variety & dining options positively (vs. 74% globally).

Safety & Security (5th) is another highlight, with nearly every respondent (97%) feeling safe in Panama (vs. 81% globally). Four in five (80%) agree they can openly express themselves and their opinions (vs. 63%), and three-quarters (75%) rate the political stability favorably (vs. 56%).¹

However, this high level of safety doesn't extend into every aspect of life. In 26th place, Panama receives one of its worst results in the index regarding how easy and safe it is to get around on foot or by bicycle. Though public transportation is affordable (5th) and there are plenty of opportunities to travel (3rd).

When it comes to the natural environment, a whopping 99% rate this factor positively (vs. 83% globally). Together with the good air quality (9th) and pleasant climate & weather (9th), this pushes Panama into the top 10 for Environment & Climate despite mediocre results for the rest of this subcategory.

An Unpleasant Climate in Kuwait (46th)

Since 2020, **Kuwait** hasn't been able to shake its last place in the Quality of Life Index — and 2025 is no exception. In fact, the country ranks last in

two out of the index's five subcategories, and in the bottom 10 for the remaining three.

The good news: expats are unlikely to have come to Kuwait for lifestyle-related reasons in the first place. Job-related reasons are much more common (70% vs. 36% globally).

According to expats, Kuwait is the worst-performing country when it comes to the Environment & Climate (46th). Around half of respondents rate the natural environment (50%) and the climate & weather (49%) negatively (vs. a respective 7% and 22% globally). And in 42nd place, Kuwait's result for the urban environment isn't much better.

Expats are similarly disappointed by the (lack of) Leisure Options (46th), with only the culinary variety & dining options (24th) receiving an average result. Public transportation is comparatively affordable (26th) but not widely available

(39th). Nor do expats have high opinions of the infrastructure for cars (37th) or the opportunity to travel (42nd).

Results across the Healthcare (39th) and Safety & Security (41st) Subcategories are less dire, but still nothing to write home about. For instance, more than half (53%) find they can't openly express themselves and their opinions (vs. 18%).

Sunshine Isn't Everything in the Philippines (45th)

Like Kuwait, the **Philippines** is no stranger to the bottom 10 of the Quality of Life Index. Its second-to-last place in 2025 is a new low, however.

The country receives its "best" result in the index in the Healthcare Subcategory, ranking 36th. This is mainly thanks to equal access to all kinds of healthcare services (18th) and a moderate availability of medical care (29th). Expats are dissatisfied with its affordability (39th), though. And only 45% have something positive to say about its quality (vs. 67% globally).

The pleasant climate & weather (14th) can't make up for the fact that the Philippines receives bottom 10 results for air quality (38th), the urban

environment (43rd), and the availability of green goods and services (45th), resulting in an overall 42nd place for the Environment & Climate Subcategory.

Nor does the sunshine automatically lead to an abundance of sporting opportunities: over a third rate (36%) this factor negatively (vs. 11% globally).

Public transportation — while mostly affordable (21st) — isn't widely available according to 42% of respondents (vs. 17% globally). And the infrastructure for cars is even worse (58% negative responses vs. 14% globally).

Only around seven in ten expats (69%) feel safe in the Philippines (vs. 81% globally), and the country lands in the bottom 10 for political stability (42nd).

Great Weather but Little Safety in Kenya (44th)

Since 2022, **Kenya** has regularly featured in the bottom 10 of the Quality of Life Index and 2025 is no different, with the country ranking 44th.

One major pain point: Travel & Transit. Kenya ranks dead last in this subcategory (46th) due to public transportation that's neither readily available (42nd) nor affordable (45th) and a road network that can't make up for the fact. Only 41% give the infrastructure for cars a positive rating (vs. 73% globally). Getting around on foot or by bicycle (45th) isn't safe or easy, either.

Speaking of safety: less than half of expats there (49%) feel safe (vs. 81% globally). Coupled with a low political stability (44th), it's hardly surprising that Kenya ranks second to last in the Safety & Security Subcategory (45th).

Results are slightly better regarding Healthcare (41st) but not by much. Only around half of respondents agree medical care is of good quality (53% vs. 67% globally) and readily available (48% vs. 68%). And close to double the global average find it expensive (40% vs. 22%).

It's not all doom and gloom, though. Kenya offers an amazing climate & weather (6th) and a lovely natural environment (15th).

The top 10 of the Quality of Life Index have seen little change since 2024: only Panama (16th to 3rd), China (19th to 6th), and Czechia (14th to 8th) are new entries in 2025.

European destinations make up the majority: Spain (1st) is joined by Austria (4th), Luxembourg (5th), Czechia (8th), and Portugal (10th). They all perform well to very well across the different areas of the index. Interestingly, they differ in their weak points. Austria receives mediocre results for Safety & Security (23rd), in large part due to political stability (32nd), while Luxembourg cannot offer good Leisure Options (38th). Czechia and

Portugal, on the other hand, receive their worst results in the Healthcare Subcategory, ranking 21st and 24th, respectively.

In the Middle East, **Qatar** (7th) shows similar highs and lows as the **UAE** (2nd): expats appreciate the Healthcare (5th and 12th, respectively), Safety & Security (6th, 4th), and Travel & Transit (6th, 11th) Subcategories. The natural environment, on the other hand, doesn't delight (Qatar 44th; UAE 42nd).

The similarities are less noticeable among the two Asian destinations in the top 10: **China** (6th) and **Japan** (9th). Both destinations get great results for Healthcare (13th, 7th) and Travel & Transit (1st, 10th). But while China can delight in terms of Leisure Options (5th vs. Japan's 23rd place), Japan provides the better Environment & Climate (11th vs. China's 23rd place).

The bottom 10 of the Quality of Life Index see a similar development as the top 10: only three countries are new in receiving this dubious distinction: Türkiye (41st), the UK (38th), and South Africa (37th).

Indonesia (40th) joins the Philippines (45th) in representing Southeast Asia. They perform similarly, with bottom 10 results across the Travel & Transit, Environment & Climate, and Safety & Security Subcategories. There's one big difference, though: while the Philippines sees 41st place for Leisure Options, Indonesia makes it into the top 10 for this subcategory, ranking 8th!

A big difference can also be found when comparing the two African destinations in the bottom 10: **Kenya** (44th) and **South Africa** (37th). While expats in the former are not satisfied with the available Healthcare (41st), South Africa receives a good 16th place in this subcategory. Personal safety remains an issue, though, with South Africa and Kenya ranking last and second to last, respectively.

Malta (42nd), Ireland (39th), and the United Kingdom (38th) are three European countries in the bottom 10. The reasons why vary. Despite good weather (7th), Malta loses a lot of ground with the Environment & Climate (44th), and expats have few positive things to say about Leisure Options (40th) and Travel & Transit (37th). The latter is also an issue in Ireland (44th), where public transportation is scarce (43rd) and unaffordable (42nd). However, Ireland's biggest issue is Healthcare (45th): the country lands in last place for three out of the four underlying factors! Expats' opinion on the topic in the UK isn't much better (43rd).

Geographically speaking the odd ones out are the **USA** (43rd) and **Türkiye** (41st), next to last-placed **Kuwait** (46th). Both receive at best mediocre results in the index: for example, the USA places 25th for Leisure Options and Türkiye 29th for Travel & Transit. But these results can't compensate for where they perform rather badly.

The USA ranks dead last when it comes to Healthcare and receives disappointing results in the Safety & Security Subcategory (43rd). Safety is also an issue in Türkiye (44th), which additionally lands in the bottom 10 of the Environment & Climate Subcategory (38th) — despite the good weather (79% positive ratings vs. 58% globally).

The Biggest Winners for Quality of Life

After a disappointing 39th place out of 53

Malaysia rose 19 spots to rank 20th in 2025. This is thanks to improved results across nearly every single factor of the index. In fact, only the affordability of public transportation is rated slightly worse in 2025 (18th vs. 17th in 2024).

The culinary variety & dining options in the country remain a highlight (6th in 2024 and 2025). They are joined by more opportunities for recreational sports and a better culture & nightlife offering: over a third (36% each) give these factors the best possible rating in 2025, compared to just 26% and 27%, respectively, in 2024.

One of Malaysia's worst areas in the index — Safety & Security — has even managed to leave the bottom 10. Following 49th place in 2024, Malaysia now ranks 35th in this subcategory.

In contrast, the improved results for **Cyprus** — with a jump from 33rd to 19th in the 2025 Quality of Life Index — are more focused. Healthcare continues to delight (6th in 2024 to 4th in 2025); Safety & Security remains decent (28th to 26th); and Travel & Transit could be better (47th to 38th).

Where Cyprus really made gains is the Leisure Options Subcategory: following 37th place in 2024, it now ranks 11th. While close to one in five respondents in 2024 were dissatisfied with the culture & nightlife on offer, this has nearly halved (19% in 2024 vs. 11%). And the share of expats satisfied with the culinary variety & dining options went from 74% to 86% in 2025.

The Environment & Climate Subcategory also saw some improvements, going from 42nd to 27th in 2025. However, with a bottom 10 place for the urban environment (40th), availability of green goods and services (38th), as well as the government's support of policies to protect the environment (37th), there's plenty of room to grow.

The Biggest Loser for Quality of Life

South Korea is the biggest loser in the Quality of Life Index, placing 32nd in 2025. A year earlier, the country ranked 10th out of 53 destinations, receiving praise particularly for its Healthcare (1st).

An aging population is putting a growing strain on the country's healthcare system, though, and reform efforts in 2024 led to major disputes in the sector with thousands of doctors-in-training stepping down.² It seems hardly surprising that expats are less satisfied with the quality of medical care (from 2nd to 17th in 2025). In 2024, over three-quarters (76%) agreed that it's easy to access all kinds of healthcare services in South Korea. In 2025, this share is down to 58%. Interestingly, expats still positively rate the general availability of healthcare services (7th).

South Korea's recent political crisis, which led to massive protests and ended with the impeachment of then-President Yoon Suk-Yeol,³ is also reflected in the survey results. In 2024, just 6% had something negative to say about the political stability in the country. A year later, this share has risen to nearly a third (31%), with South Korea consequently falling to the bottom 10 for Safety & Security (37th).

The country also receives bottom 10 results in the Environment & Climate (41st) and Leisure Options (42nd) Subcategories. While it's never done particularly well in these topics, this too reflects worsening opinions by expats. For instance, satisfaction with the culinary variety & dining options has gone from 74% happy expats in 2024 to just 58% in 2025.

Where to Go (or Avoid) for a Lively Social Circle

If you're a social butterfly, it's best to stay clear of Nordic countries — unless you fancy a challenge!

Methodology

The Ease of Settling In Index is composed of three subcategories with two to three factors each.

The **Finding Friends** Subcategory considers whether expats are happy with their social life; if they have a personal support network in their new home abroad; and what they say about making local friends.

Culture & Welcome summarizes whether expats feel welcome and at home, as well as how easy it is to get used to the local culture of their host country.

And the **Local Friendliness** Subcategory factors in the friendliness of the local population — both in general and towards foreign residents.

In 2025, a total of 46 destinations met the minimum sample size of 50 respondents and thus ranked in the index.

Mexico's (1st) Legendary Easy-Going Culture

Mexico has topped the Ease of Settling In Index since 2014 — only dropping to 2nd place a

couple of times. In 2025, the Culture & Welcome Subcategory (1st) takes the lead, followed by Finding Friends (2nd) and Local Friendliness (3rd).

At more than 20 percentage points higher than the global average, expats feel both at home (79% vs. 58% globally) and welcome (88% vs. 62%) in Mexico. They're also happy with their social life (74% vs. 52%) and find that making local friends is easy (70% agree vs. 38%).

This is reflected in the make-up of friends and acquaintances. More than a third of respondents in Mexico (35%) describe them as mostly locals, more than double the global average of 16%. Interestingly, only 19% are friends with mostly other expats, in contrast to 38% of expats worldwide.

Making Friends Is Easy in Panama (2nd)

Panama also excels in the Ease of Settling In Index (2nd). The Finding Friends Subcategory comes in 1st place, and more than four in five expats (82%) are happy with their social life in Panama (vs. 52% globally).

In contrast to Mexico, only 6% of respondents in Panama describe their friends and acquaintances as mostly locals (vs. 16% globally). Instead, more than half (55%) have a diverse circle of both expats and locals (vs. 46%).

Overall, expats find it easy to make local friends (75% agree vs. 38% globally), and nearly nine in ten (88%) say the locals are friendly towards foreign residents (vs. 60%).

You'll Find a Support Network in Colombia (3rd)

Rounding up the top 3 in the index is **Colombia** in 3rd place. The star factor is having a personal support network in the country, which expats in Colombia rank in 1st place — nearly four in five expats (79%) agree they have people around them to ask for practical/emotional support, compared to 55% globally.

Colombian locals are also seen as friendly, in general (85% agree vs. 62% globally) and towards foreigners (87% vs. 60%). And respondents appear well-integrated, too: 51% describe their friends and acquaintances as mostly locals (vs. 16% globally), while only 8% run in mostly expat circles (vs. 38%).

No Warm Welcome in Kuwait (46th)

Since the beginning of the survey in 2014, **Kuwait** has placed dead last — except once in 2017 — in the Ease of Settling In Index. In 2025, all three subcategories of the index are again in the bottom 10, with Culture & Welcome (46th) and Local Friendliness (46th) last.

Around double the global average of expats say they feel neither at home (44% vs. 23% globally) nor welcome (37% vs. 18%) in Kuwait. Yet respondents are split regarding whether the local culture is easy to

get used to: 34% say it's easy (vs. 58% globally), the other 34% say it's difficult (vs. 22%). Either way, it's not good news in comparison to the global average.

Norway's (45th) Locals Need Time to Open Up

Another familiar face in the index is Norway, which

graces the bottom 10 for the sixth year in a row. The most challenging aspect for expats is getting used to Norwegian culture — 46% say it's difficult, more than double the global average of 22%.

Only 17% of respondents find it easy to make local friends (vs. 38% globally), which could be tied to the perceived unfriendliness of the locals. More than two in five expats in Norway (41%) find the locals generally unfriendly (vs. 19% globally).

Difficulties Integrating in Finland (44th)

In 44th place for the Ease of Settling In is another Nordic country: **Finland**. It dropped to the bottom 10 in 2024 and hasn't recovered. Expats don't quite feel welcome (44th) or at home (43rd). They're also unhappy with their social life (48% are dissatisfied vs. 29% globally), and more than two-thirds (68%) say making local friends is difficult (vs. 42% globally).

When it comes to their friends and acquaintances, 49% of respondents in Finland describe them as a mixed group of locals and expats (vs. 46% globally), and 42% as mostly other expats (vs. 38%). So, not all hope is lost in making a couple of Finnish friends!

There are eight familiar faces in the top 10 of the Ease of Settling In Index from 2024. **Oman** (7th) and **Cyprus** (10th) are new additions, improving by 5 and 7 ranks, respectively. For both countries, expats highly rate the Culture & Welcome (Oman 10th, Cyprus 9th). Though locals may not be as friendly in Cyprus (16th) as they are in Oman (7th).

Brazil (6th) joins the three Latin American countries filling the top 3. These four destinations receive top 10 results for all three subcategories and their individual factors — except for expats' happiness with their social life in Brazil, which sees 14th place.

Asia is represented by **Indonesia** (4th), the **Philippines** (5th), and **Thailand** (9th). What unites all three is a high-ranking Local Friendliness Subcategory (1st, 4th, and 8th, respectively).

Kenya (8th) is the only African country to make the list. Expats find the locals to be friendly in general (8th) and towards foreigners (8th). Finding Friends (5th) is also a pleasant experience.

In contrast to the top 10, the bottom 10 is heavily populated by European countries — with even four of the five Nordic countries making an appearance. Joining Norway (45th) and Finland (44th) are Sweden (42nd) and Denmark (40th).

The only saving grace is Denmark's Local Friendliness (35th), which is the only subcategory to make it out of the bottom 10.

More south geographically, there's **Germany** (43rd), **Austria** (41st), **Switzerland** (39th), and **Czechia** (37th). For Germany and Switzerland, nearly every single factor of the index is in the bottom 10. Austria and Czechia, meanwhile, perform a little better for Finding Friends and Culture & Welcome. Having a support network in Czechia (15th) in particular is a silver lining.

South Korea (38th) is the only new addition to the bottom 10. With **Kuwait** (46th), they represent the odd ones out. Nevertheless, they follow the trend of all three of the index's subcategories in the bottom 10.

The Biggest Winners in 2025

For the Ease of Settling In Index, **Hungary** is the biggest winner having jumped 14 spots to land in 30th place, after seeing the bottom 10 in 2024. The biggest improvement is in the Culture & Welcome Subcategory (from 48th to 25th). The share of respondents who say they feel at home in Hungary increased nearly 20 percentage points from 47% in 2024 (vs. 58% globally) to 65% (vs. 58%).

People are not as unhappy with their social life: 21% of expats in Hungary give this factor a negative rating, down 17 percentage points from 2024 (vs. 29% globally both years).

Showing a 12-rank improvement are **Malta** (20th in 2025) and **Canada** (27th). In both countries, expats have seen an improvement in having a personal support network (from the bottom 10 to 26th and 35th place, respectively).

The Biggest Losers in 2025

The biggest losses in rank in the Ease of Settling In Index aren't as dramatic as the gains. **Greece** (14th) fell four ranks, while **Thailand** (9th) and **Singapore** (33rd) fell three ranks each.

Nevertheless, four ranks were enough to push Greece out of the top 10. The biggest change is in the Finding Friends Subcategory (from 9th to 16th). It seems that people are less likely to agree they have a personal support network — the share of disagreeing respondents is up to 28% (vs. 27%). globally), compared to just 14% in 2024 (vs. 27%).

For Thailand, the Culture & Welcome Subcategory and its three factors all dropped out of the top 10, yet none rank lower than 16th, which is still pretty decent. In Singapore, the biggest change was also in the personal support network (from 29th to 38th). Similar to Greece, the share of respondents who don't agree they have such a network increased from 25% in 2024 to 37% in 2025 (vs. 27% globally).

Top Prospects, Good Hours & More: Countries for Your Career

European destinations make up half of the top 10 — but the winner of the 2025 Working Abroad Index is a bit of a surprise.

Methodology

The Working Abroad Index is based on four subcategories with two to three rating factors each.

The **Work & Leisure** Subcategory reflects expats' happiness with their working hours and work-life balance.

Salary & Job Security looks at a destination's state of the economy, the local job security, as well as whether expats feel they're paid fairly for their work.

Expats' general job satisfaction and how much they feel the local business culture supports flexibility (e.g., remote work, flexible hours) make up the **Work Culture & Satisfaction** Subcategory.

Lastly, **Career Prospects** considers expats' rating of the local job market; their personal career opportunities; and if moving to the country improved their career prospects.

For a destination to be included in the index, at least 50 respondents were required. In 2025, a total of 46 countries or territories met this minimum sample size.

A Top Work–Life Balance in Panama (1st)

Following an already respectable 12th place the previous year, **Panama** jumps to the top in the 2025 Working Abroad Index — a result that's particularly interesting considering how work isn't a main motivation for expats to move to Panama in the first place. Less than one in five respondents (19%) name a job-related reason for their move (vs. 36% globally).

Instead, many originally relocated to retire there (18% vs. 3% globally), were looking for a better quality of life (10% vs. 7%), or simply enjoy living abroad (9% vs. 4%).

Still, if you are working, Panama seems the place to be! Respondents rate the country 1st for their general job satisfaction, their working hours, as well as the work-life balance. The fact that an above-average share of expats can work remotely at least some (49% vs. 45% globally) or even all the time (34% vs. 19%) might be one reason here.

Close to a quarter each work as freelancers (24% vs. 11% globally) or are business owners (22% vs. 7%).

Overall, two-thirds (67%) regard both their job security as well as personal career opportunities positively (vs. a global 54% and 52%, respectively). And an even higher share (78%) give the state of Panama's economy a good grade (vs. 57% globally).

Improved Career Prospects in Ireland (2nd)

Like Panama, **Ireland** went from missing out on the top 10 in 2024 (11th) to rank an impressive 2nd in the 2025 Working Abroad Index.

Expats often work in IT (17% vs. 11% globally), healthcare (12% vs. 8%), and finance (10% vs. 7%) — and they're more likely to work in chemical and pharmaceutical industries, too (6% vs. 2%).

The country manages a top 10 result in each of the four subcategories of the index. Expats especially praise the local job market (2nd) and their personal career opportunities (6th). Seven in ten respondents (70%) agree that moving to Ireland improved their prospects (vs. 55% globally) — 43% even agree completely (vs. 23%).

Others agree: close to three-quarters (74%) are satisfied with their working hours (vs. 61% globally). With an average full-time week of 40.4 hours, expats in Ireland work fewer hours than the global average (42.5 h).

Saudi Arabia (3rd) Offers an Excellent Job Market

Saudi Arabia completes the podium, ranking 3rd in the 2025 Working Abroad Index. That's especially great news for the 70% of expats who moved there primarily for work-related reasons, a share that's nearly twice the global average of 36%!

The long working hours — expats in full-time jobs spend an average 46.1 hours a week at work (vs. 42.5 h globally) — don't delight, however, with Saudi Arabia only ranking midfield in the Work & Leisure Subcategory (29th).

But the country makes up for it with an excellent job market (1st) and state of the economy (2nd). In fact,

four in five respondents (80%) agree that moving to Saudi Arabia has improved their career prospects,

54% even agree completely (vs. a respective 55% and 29%, globally).

Top fields among expats in Saudi Arabia are construction (14% vs. 3% globally), IT (9% vs. 11%), manufacturing & engineering (8% vs. 6%), as well as healthcare (8% vs. 8%).

No Job Satisfaction in South Korea (46th)

South Korea has taken a major hit when it comes to working abroad, falling from 37th place out of 53 destinations in 2024 to rank dead last in the 2025 index.

The country places in the bottom 10 for each of the four subcategories. In fact, expats rate it the worst worldwide (46th out of 46) for personal career opportunities, working hours, work-life balance, and general job satisfaction. And more than half (54%) regard the local job market negatively (vs. 33% globally).

South Korea's economy may be a major player in Asia, but it has been battered by domestic political turmoil and tensions in global trade.¹

Respondents also don't agree they're paid fairly for their work (46th) or that the local business culture supports flexibility (46th).

Despite all this, a job is still a notable reason for expats to move to South Korea: 45% named work-related reasons as their main motivation (vs. 36% globally), and 80% of all respondents in the country are working right now, 11 percentage points more than the global average of 69%.

A Struggling Economy in Türkiye (45th)

Expats rate the Turkish economy the worst worldwide (46th), with more than three times the global average giving it a negative rating (67% vs. 21% globally)! This is one, but certainly not the only reason for **Türkiye**'s second-to-last place in the 2025 Working Abroad Index (45th).

Consequently, overathird (36%) rate their personal career opportunities in Türkiye negatively (vs. 27% globally), and less than half (43%) are happy in their job (vs. 60%). The country also ranks second-to-last for working hours (45th) and expats' work-life balance (45th).



Work is at least not a main motivation to move to Türkiye: just 31% name a job-related reason (vs. 36% globally). Instead, they're more likely than the average to have moved there for their education (13% vs. 9% globally), because they simply enjoy living abroad (9% vs. 4%), or in search of an adventure (8% vs. 5%).

Shorter Hours but Worse Prospects in Greece (44th)

Placing 44th out of 46 destinations, **Greece** is the second Mediterranean destination in the bottom 3 of the 2025 Working Abroad Index. It's the worst country in the ranking for improved prospects: close to a quarter (23%) very much disagree that the move was good for their career (vs. 11% globally).

In fact, close to half the respondents (48%) are dissatisfied with the Greek economy (vs. 21% globally), and a similar share (47%) rate the local job market negatively (vs. 33%).

Despite shorter-than-average hours — expats with a full-time job in Greece work 40.9 hours

per week (vs. a global average of 42.5 hours) — respondents are dissatisfied with their working hours (40th), too. Interestingly, over a third (35%) say they work remotely all the time (vs. 19% globally). This may be related to the above-average share of freelancers and self-employed expats among respondents in Greece (26% vs. 11% globally).

In 2025, there was little change in the top 10 of the Working Abroad Index. Seven out of the ten countries already featured among the best the previous year. And while **Panama** (1st) and **Ireland** (2nd) are new to the top 10, they were pretty close in 2024, ranking 12th and 11th, respectively.

The one country that stands out is **China**: its 9th place in the 2025 index represents a 21-spot jump from its 30th rank in 2024! As such, it's one of the biggest winners in the index (more on that later).

From a geographical perspective, half of the top 10 can be found in Europe: next to Ireland (2nd), there's the Netherlands (4th), Denmark (6th), Luxembourg (7th), and Belgium (8th). All five receive good to very good results in the Salary & Job Security Subcategory, with only Belgium missing out on a top 10 placement here (11th).

The **UAE** in 5th place joins **Saudi Arabia** (3rd) in representing the Middle East among the best countries for working abroad. Both countries delight when it comes to improved career prospects (Saudi Arabia 1st, UAE 2nd) as well as the state of their respective economy (2nd and 1st, respectively). The majority of expats in Saudi Arabia (70%) and the UAE (58%) also moved there for work-related reasons, compared to 36% of respondents worldwide.

Panama (1st), China (9th), and Australia (10th), meanwhile, are the odd ones out. Like Panama, Australia delights with a good work-life balance (4th), and expats voice a high satisfaction with their job (6th). The latter is also true for China (3rd), where more than seven in ten respondents (71%) point out that moving there also improved their career prospects (vs. 55% globally).

The 10 worst countries also list a few familiar faces: seven of the ten destinations received this dubious distinction in 2024, while **Portugal** (40th in 2025) and **Hungary** (37th) weren't far behind. Only **South Korea** saw a larger drop, ranking last (46th) in 2025 after a 37th place in 2024.

Interestingly, European destinations make up half of the bottom 10, too. Next to **Greece** (44th), there's **Finland** (43rd), **Italy** (42nd), **Portugal** (40th), and **Hungary** (37th). Greece and Italy have regularly ranked among the worst countries for working abroad in previous years, and Portugal and Hungary didn't fare much better, either. Finland, on the other

hand, only saw a major drop in the ranking in 2024 (from 5th in 2023 to 46th in 2024) — from which it hasn't recovered.

One of the weakest areas among all five countries: the available career opportunities. Only Hungary narrowly escapes the bottom 10 for this factor. However, it's dragged down by a second-to-last place for its economy (45th).

Next to **South Korea** (46th), two other Asian destinations cannot delight career-focused expats: **Japan** (41st) and the **Philippines** (39th). Expats in these countries find the local business unsupportive when it comes to flexibility (e.g., remote work) and think the local economy could be better.

However, that's where the similarities end. While Japan ranks midfield in the Career Prospects Subcategory (25th), South Korea (45th) and the Philippines (41st) receive some of their worst results here. On the other hand, close to three-quarters of expats in the Philippines (74% vs. 57% globally) find they're paid fairly for their work. In Japan (48%) and South Korea (42%), this share is notably below the global average.

Finally, **Kuwait** (38th) hasn't seen much change. Respondents continue to appreciate the state of the economy (8th) but are dissatisfied with their work-life balance (44th) and job security (45th).

The Biggest Winners in 2025 for Working Abroad

In the 2025 Working Abroad Index, several countries managed to jump up in the ranking. After placing in the bottom 10 in 2024, **Malaysia** rose 27 spots to 20th in 2025. The country sees improvements across the board, and most notably for expats' satisfaction with their working hours (from 48th place in 2024 to 22nd in 2025). Close to two-thirds of respondents (64%) are happy with

their work-life balance. In 2024, only about half (51%) said the same.

Expats' general satisfaction with their job has notably improved (from 46th to 17th place), as has their opinion regarding personal career opportunities (from 41st to 20th). Only 4% have something negative to say about the state of Malaysia's economy. In 2024, this share was five times as high (20% negative ratings).

In 9th place, **China** not only grabs a spot in the top 10 in 2025 but it's also one of the biggest winners in the index, following a mediocre 30th place in 2024. In 2024, the country already received — and continues to receive — top 10 results for expats' personal career opportunities, fair pay, and whether relocating to China further improved their prospects.

Results for working hours (from 40th to 10th) and job security (29th to 7th) have notably improved, though. And in 2024, only about a third (36%) rated the local job market positively. In 2025, this share increased 10 percentage points to an above average 46% (vs. 39% globally).

Rising 20 spots to rank 31st in 2025, **Cyprus** manages to leave behind the bottom 10 of the Working Abroad Index for the first time since 2021. Results have improved across all factors of the index, with the most notable jump for personal career opportunities. In 2024, only 27% of respondents rated this factor positively. A year later, nearly double this share (52%) are satisfied.

Similarly, respondents are much more likely to view the local job market (from 44th to 16th) and their working hours (50th to 17th) positively. Their general job satisfaction has consequently gone up: 52% of expats in Cyprus are happy with their work in 2025, compared to 39% in 2024. Though this result is still below the global average of 60%.

The Biggest Losers for Working Abroad

In 2024, **Indonesia** snagged a top 10 spot in the Working Abroad Index (9th). A year later, it's the undisputed biggest loser in the Working Abroad Index, down 19 places to rank 28th. An above-average 67% of expats (vs. 60% globally) are happy with their work-life balance, but this good result is disappointing compared to 2024's share of 79%.

Even worse: Indonesia tumbles down the ranks for personal career opportunities (from 1st to 36th!) and job security (14th to 41st). In 2024, close to three in ten respondents (29%) gave the latter point the best possible rating. In 2025, this share is down to just 5%.

Worsened career prospects are also one of the reasons for **Brazil**'s drop in the Working Abroad Index (from 18th to 33th in 2025). Close to a third (32%) rate them negatively in 2025 (vs. 19% in 2024), and only 37% give the local job market a good grade. This is a notable drop compared to 2024, when more than half the respondents (51%) viewed Brazil's job market favorably.

In 2024, over three-quarters of expats in Brazil (76%) said they're paid fairly for their work (based on the industry, their qualifications, etc.). In 2025, this share dropped to 55% of respondents. A possible consequence of these developments: expats' overall job satisfaction dropped from 2nd place to 29th in 2025.

Methodology

For the Personal Finance Index, expats rated three different factors on a scale of one (very bad) to seven (very good): general cost of living; satisfaction with their financial situation; and whether a respondent's disposable household income is enough to lead a comfortable life.

To be featured in the ranking, a country must have a minimum of 50 respondents. In 2025, 46 destinations made this threshold.

Vietnam (1st) Retains Its Crown, Again

Finance Index but is also 2nd overall in the ranking. The South American country maintains its 2nd rank in the index from last year, with expats ranking their satisfaction with their financial situation in 1st place.

A significant 92% of expats there say their disposable income is about or more than enough to lead a comfortable life (vs. 69% globally).

And not one expat cited high cost of living as a big concern prior to their move (vs. 21%). Interestingly, 25% of respondents are retired (vs. 11%), and 69% make 50,000 USD or less in gross yearly income (vs. 52%). Clearly, the low cost of living is a major draw!

Panama (3rd) Is a Favorite for Retirees

In 3rd place in the index is **Panama** — the overall winner of the Expat Insider survey now for the second year in a row. More than a third of expats there (35% each) are retired (vs. 11% globally) and plan to stay forever (vs. 24%).

No surprises there, as 87% of respondents find their disposable income to be about or more than enough to lead a comfortable life (vs. 69% globally). And in terms of satisfaction with their financial situation, 78% are happy (vs. 54%).

A Tough Financial Situation in Canada (46th)

In last place for Personal Finance is a country that's no stranger to the index's bottom 10: Canada.

More than half of expats there are unhappy with the general cost of living (62% vs. 40% globally) and find that their disposable household income isn't enough (52% vs. 31%). In both cases, that's 20 percentage points higher than the global average.

One thing I don't like about living in Canada is the high cost of living - there are taxes for every single thing.

And nearly a third of respondents (30%) cited Canada's high cost of living as one of their major concerns prior to their move (vs. 21% globally). Once there, 40% aren't satisfied with their financial situation (vs. 26%).

Another familiar face in the bottom 10 of the index is the United Kingdom (45th). In a similar fashion to Canada, 61% of expats in the UK are unhappy with the cost of living (vs. 40% globally) and 51% find that their disposable household income isn't

Compared to 2024, nine of the countries in the top 10 retain this title. Only **Malaysia** (9th) is a new addition, edging its way in from 11th place last year.

Interestingly, no European country makes the list, which is overwhelmingly occupied by Asian countries. In addition to **Vietnam** (1st), there's **China** (4th), **Thailand** (5th), **Indonesia** (6th), the **Philippines** (7th), and **Malaysia** (9th). What's noticeable is all three factors of the index are ranked in the top 10 for these countries — except for Malaysia, whose general cost of living (4th) is the only factor in the top 10.

The list is rounded up by four Latin American countries: **Colombia** (2nd), **Panama** (3rd), **Mexico** (8th), and **Brazil** (10th). A similar trend to the Asian countries can be seen: all factors of the index rank in the top 10 for these countries. Only Brazil is the odd one out with worse, but still above average, results for costs (16th) and expats' satisfaction with their financial situation (13th).

There are three new additions to the bottom 10 for 2025: **Qatar** (42nd) and **Australia** (38th) simply slid into the bottom, whereas **South Korea** (40th) saw a hard drop of 25 places from 2024.

Qatar ranks dead last for disposable household incomes being enough to lead a comfortable life (46th), whereas expats in Australia and South Korea are more displeased with the cost of living (38th) and their financial situation (45th), respectively.

The four European countries at the bottom are continuing their tradition from 2024. In addition to **Finland** (44th) and the **UK** (45th), there's **Ireland** (39th) and **Norway** (37th) — with **Türkiye** (43rd) joining in from the continent. A common thread for these countries is expats ranking the cost of living in the bottom 10.

As for **Singapore** (41st), it resumes its spot in the bottom 10 for the third year in a row. As in the previous two years, expats there rank the cost of living dead last (46th).

The Biggest Winners for Personal Finance

Compared to 2024, the biggest winner in the Personal Finance Index is **Cyprus**, which managed a 22-rank jump from 38th place to 16th. It seems that expats there are much more satisfied with their financial situation. In 2024, 30% were unhappy

with this factor (vs. 26% globally). One year later, this share is down to 18% (vs. 26%).

This could be related to more disposable income; in just one year, the percentage of expats in Cyprus who find their household income to be about or more than enough increased from 61% (vs. 70% globally) to 74% (vs. 69%).

Malta (21st) and Kuwait (29th) managed to move up 15 ranks each. Similar to Cyprus, the share of expats in Malta who are happy with their disposable household income increased. Nearly half (47%) find it to be *more* than enough to lead a comfortable life (vs. 40% globally). Last year, only 34% said the same (vs. 41%).

There's also good news for Kuwait, which left the bottom 10 of the index to rank 29th. This is in part due to expats' increased satisfaction with their financial situation: following a spot in the bottom 10 in 2024 (48th), Kuwait now ranks 29th for this factor.

The Biggest Losers for Personal Finance

South Korea dropped a whopping 25 places in the ranking to 40th place — a bottom 10 result. In one year, the percentage of respondents satisfied with their financial situation nearly halved, dropping from 70% (vs. 54% globally) to just 38% (vs. 54%). It appears expats' perception of the general cost of living has noticeably worsened (from 20th to 33rd), despite South Korea's comparatively steady, moderate inflation rate of around 2%.¹

South Africa's fall in the ranking isn't as dramatic, but the country still lost 13 places to rank 31st. Two of the index's factors have dropped to the bottom 10: whether disposable household income is enough to lead a comfortable life (from 19th to 39th) and expats' satisfaction with their financial situation (from 31st to 39th).

Indeed, the former factor has shown a major change in the percentage that find their income is about or more than enough to lead a comfortable life — in 2024, 73% of respondents said as much (vs. 70% globally); in 2025, only 58% say the same (vs. 69%).

Where It's (Not So) Easy to Manage the Basics of Life Abroad

Paperwork, housing, language barriers, and more: countries in the Middle East continue to make it easy for expats to handle the essentials. And among the top 3, there's a notable newcomer.

Methodology

The Expat Essentials Index is based on four subcategories with two to four underlying factors each:

Digital Life considers the restrictiveness of online services in general, the online availability of admin and government services specifically, as well as the availability of high-speed internet and the ease of paying without cash.

The **Admin Topics** Subcategory looks at how easy respondents say it is to deal with local bureaucracy, open a bank account in their new home, or get a visa in the first place.

The ease of learning the local and/or official language(s) in an expats' new home, and whether it's difficult to live there without speaking it, is summarized in the **Language** Subcategory.

And lastly, the **Housing** Subcategory reflects housing affordability and how easy it is to find.

Respondents rated these points on a scale of one (very bad / disagree completely) to seven (very good / agree completely).

To be included in the ranking, a country needs a minimum of 50 respondents. In 2025, 46 destinations met this threshold.

Easy Going in the UAE (1st)

For the second year in a row, the **UAE** places 1st in the Expat Essentials Index.

Expats have no trouble getting by in the UAE without speaking the local language (1st) and agree it's not difficult to get a visa to move there (1st). Bureaucracy in general is not a big issue: close to two-thirds (65%) find it's easy to deal with the local authorities, a notable contrast to the global average of 37%.

Access to high-speed internet (4th) and the availability of online admin services (1st) surely helps: 61% of respondents in the UAE rate the latter as very good (vs. 24% globally).

However, not every digital topic delights: two-thirds of respondents (67%) agree that access to online services such as social media is unrestricted.

> Worldwide, a much larger share of 83% say the same about their host country, with the UAE thus ranking in the bottom 10 for this factor (42nd).

> Luckily, housing is much less of an issue. Expats agree it's comparatively affordable (18th) as well as easy to find (8th). More than double the global average give the

latter point the best possible rating (38% vs. 17% globally).

For the third year in a row, Panama lands in the top 10 of the Expat Essentials Index — this time on the podium, placing 2nd.

First for Housing: Panama (2nd)

Expats praise the country for nearly every aspect of the index. Panama's "worst" result is an average 30th place for the online availability of administrative services. Other aspects of the Digital Life Subcategory delight: over nine in ten respondents agree it's easy to get high-speed internet access (91% vs. 80% globally); pay without cash (97% vs. 85%); and enjoy unrestricted access to online services like social media (92% vs. 83%).

Panama also stands out for the ease of getting a visa (5th) and, most notably, for Housing (1st). More than double the global average rate the affordability of accommodation positively (71% vs. 34%), with close to three in ten respondents (28%) giving it the best possible rating (vs. 11% globally). And an even higher share (90%) point out it's easy to find, too (vs. 44% globally).

Lastly, Panama ranks 2nd in the Language Subcategory. Over three in five expats (63%) agree it's not difficult to live there without speaking the local language, compared to less than half the survey respondents worldwide (47%). A similar share (64%) find it easy to learn (vs. 39% globally). Though to be fair, for close to a quarter of respondents in Panama (23%), Spanish is already their native language.

No Language Barriers in Malaysia (3rd)

Malaysia continues to experience ups and downs in the Expat Essentials Index. Following 4th place in 2023, the country fell out of the top 10 to rank 13th in 2024. A year later, it's grabbed a

spot on the podium, ranking 3rd.

The Southeast Asian country continues to offer expats affordable (4th) and easily available (10th) housing, with more than a third of respondents (36%) giving the affordability of accommodation the best possible rating (vs. 11% globally).

Malaysia does even better in the Language Subcategory (3rd). Close to three-quarters (74%) agree it's easy to live there without speaking the local language (vs. 47% globally), though less than a third (32%) consider it easy to learn (vs. 39%). Due to the country's colonial history, English is widely spoken, especially in business and the media.¹

Malaysia does less well in other areas of the Expat Essentials Index, though its 21st and 22nd place in the Admin Topics and Digital Life Subcategories, respectively, reflect above-average results.

Cash Is Still King in Germany (46th)

For the fourth year in a row, **Germany** places last in the Expat Essentials Index (46th out of 46 destinations) — with bottom 10 placements across all four subcategories.

Germany continues to struggle with a lack of fast fiber-optic internet connections and digitalization of its services.² This is also noted by expats: over 42% rate the availability of online admin services negatively, twice the global average of 21%. And compared to 80% globally, just 56% agree it's easy to get high-speed internet access at home.

Combined with a last place for cashless payment options, it's hardly surprising that Germany once again comes last in the Digital Life Subcategory (46th).

It's not only the lack of online services that makes handling admin topics tricky. Close to two-thirds (65%) rate the German bureaucracy negatively (vs. 41% globally) — around a third (32%) even give it the worst possible rating (vs. 16%).

Results for Language (45th) aren't much better. Two-thirds (67%) find German difficult to learn,

compared to 41% of all respondents who say the same about their host country's local language. Indeed, close to three in five expats (58%) share they worried about the language barrier prior to moving to Germany (vs. 32% globally).

Finally, Germany places 43rd for Housing. While costs are high (37th), the actual search seems to be a bigger issue. Over three in five respondents in Germany (63%) say it's difficult to find housing (vs. 36% globally).

Winding Bureaucracy in Türkiye (45th)

Türkiye is the second-worst performing country in the Expat Essentials Index (45th).

Major pain points are the lack of high-speed internet (45th) and restricted access to online services like social media (45th). Despite this, an average share of respondents rate the availability of administrative services online positively (58% vs. 59% globally).

Not that this means there's little red tape. In fact, only a fifth (20%) agree it's easy to deal with the local authorities and bureaucracy (vs. 37% globally). And less than half (46%) say the same about opening a local bank account (vs. 62% agreeing globally).

Accommodation in Türkiye is neither simple to find (44% negative ratings vs. 36% globally) nor easy to afford

(60% vs. 48%).

And the language barrier was a worry prior to expats' relocation to Türkiye, at least according to 54% of respondents (vs. 32% globally). The country's bottom 10 placement in the Language Subcategory (37th) seems to prove them right.

Language Woes in South Korea (44th)

South Korea has never done particularly well in the Expat Essentials Index. But its 44th place in 2025 is its first time in the bottom 10.

The underlying results present a mixed picture: expats appreciate South Korea for the ease of cashless payment options (18th) and rank it 1st for its high-speed internet. However, while connections are quick, online services like social media aren't necessarily unrestricted (38th) and admin tasks can't always be done online (35th).

Or maybe those services are only available in Korean? The local language is something expats struggle with, with the country placing 44th in the respective subcategory. More than half (53%) disagree it's easy to live in South Korea without local language skills (vs. 34% globally), and close to two-thirds (64%) find it difficult to learn (vs. 41%). Unsurprisingly, the language barrier was a major concern prior to the move (58% vs. 32% globally).

Last but not least, only around a quarter (26%) agree it's easy for expats to find accommodation (vs. 44% globally). And a similar share (24%) considers it affordable, 10 percentage points below the global average of 34%.

Compared to 2024, only two countries are new in the top 10 of the Expat Essentials Index: **Malaysia** (3rd) and **Colombia** (9th).

As in 2024, a fair share of the best countries in the index can be found in the Middle East: the **UAE** (1st) is joined by **Saudi Arabia** (4th), **Oman** (5th), and **Qatar** (6th), while 2024's second-placed Bahrain simply didn't have enough respondents to feature in the 2025 ranking.

Expats in these destinations benefit from a lack of red tape — Oman's 8th place in the Admin Topics Subcategory is the "worst" result here — and readily available housing. Worldwide, 44% of respondents agree it's easy for expats to find accommodation. In these four destinations agreement is notably higher, ranging from 56% to 68%.

What's more, expats consider it easy to live in these countries even without speaking Arabic: the UAE (1st), Oman (2nd), and Qatar (5th) place in the top 5 for this point, with Saudi Arabia a bit behind (16th). The bad news? All four destinations rank in the bottom 10 when it comes to unrestricted access to online services.

Indonesia (8th) joins Malaysia (3rd) in representing Southeast Asia in the index. Like Malaysia, Indonesia stands out for affordable (6th) and easily available (7th) housing. Results in the Admin Topics (17th) and Language (13th) Subcategories aren't quite as good, but still above average. What keeps Indonesia from ranking even higher? Expats' dissatisfaction with Digital Life (39th), including the availability of online admin services (just 41% positive ratings vs. 59% globally).

Three Latin American destinations have made it into the top 10: next to **Panama** (2nd), there's **Mexico** (7th) and **Colombia** (9th). Admin Topics might not delight — ranking 35th, Colombia only just escapes the bottom 10 for this subcategory — but respondents appreciate housing, with all three countries ranking in the top 10 for this topic.

Plus, picking up Spanish doesn't seem be much of an issue: around three in five expats in Mexico (59%) and Panama (64%) agree learning the local language is easy. In Colombia, the share is even higher at 71%, compared to a global average of just 39%.

Geographically the odd one out, **Kenya** (10th) ranks in the top 10 of the index for the fourth year running. Expats report few language struggles (4th in the respective subcategory) and appreciate the available housing: two-thirds (66%) agree it's easy to find, with 39% even giving this point the best possible rating (vs. a global 44% and 17%, respectively).

Like the top 10, the bottom 10 have seen little change. Only South Korea (2024: 36th out of 53; 2025: 44th out of 46) and Ireland (43rd vs. 37th) are new in this list.

Six of the ten countries can be found in Europe: in addition to **Germany** (46th), there's **Italy** (43rd), **Greece** (42nd), **France** (40th), **Czechia** (39th), and **Ireland** (37th). Among the six, only Ireland stands out well for Admin Topics, ranking 10th while all the others except for Czechia (23rd) can be found in the bottom 10 for this subcategory. Ireland in turn is dragged down by its last place in the Housing Subcategory (46th).

Digital Life is an issue in Germany (46th), Greece (41st), and Italy (40th), in large part due to a lack of cashless payment options; hard-to-get high-speed internet; and limited online admin services. France and Czechia, meanwhile, lose ground due

to bad results in the Language Subcategory, ranking 38th and 39th, respectively — though for different reasons! Around three-quarters of expats in Czechia (76%) find the local language difficult to learn (vs. 41% globally), while just a quarter of respondents in France (25%) agree it's easy to live there without speaking French (vs. 47%).

South Korea (44th), **Japan** (41st), and **China** (38th) represent Asia in the bottom 10. The language is a notable hurdle, with Japan ranking last for this subcategory. Language problems may also tie into expats' dissatisfaction with Admin Topics. For example, worldwide 62% of respondents agree that opening a local bank account is easy. In these three countries, this share is 40% or less.

Opinions differ when it comes to the housing search. While South Korea (38th) and Japan (39th) place in the bottom 10 for this factor, China (12th) is closer to the top 10. Similarly, results in the Digital Life Subcategory vary widely: South Korea places 1st for high-speed internet, China 41st; China ranks 7th for cashless payment options, Japan lands in the bottom 10 (44th).

The Biggest Winners for Expat Essentials

After three years in the bottom 10 of the Expat Essentials Index, **Malta** (32nd) jumped 16 places in 2025. Expats there are still very dissatisfied with how difficult it is to open a local bank account (45th out of 46 in 2025). But the country has seen a 22-place improvement when it comes to the ease of getting a visa (from 31st to 9th). In early 2024, Malta launched the so-called Specialist Employee Initiative as an additional visa option for highly skilled individuals³ that might have helped here.

The country has also made notable gains when it comes to finding housing (43rd to 19th): in 2024, two in five expats (40%) disagreed it was easy. In 2025, only 25% maintain this negative view.

With its 17th place in 2025, **Canada** finally seems to be at the end of its downward trend in the index: while it ranked 10th in 2022, results in 2023 (20th) and 2024 (31st) were much less positive. Nearly every factor of the index receives better ratings in 2025, though general trends that were already visible in previous years remain the same: learning the local language is easy (4th), it's difficult to get a visa (41st), and housing remains expensive (40th).

However, finding housing seems slightly less of an issue now: in 2024, more than half the respondents in Canada (53%) rated this factor negatively. While still high, this share is down 10 percentage points at 43% in 2025.

The Biggest Losers for Expat Essentials

South Korea is not only one of the worst performing countries in the index (see details above), it's also the biggest loser in the 2025 Expat Essentials Index, falling from 36th place out of 53 destinations in 2024 to rank 44th out of 46 in 2025.

Especially in the Admin Topics Subcategory, the country has lost a lot of ground (from 27th to 41st in 2025). And the housing search seems to have grown more difficult in South Korea: the share of respondents who agree it's easy for expats to find housing has dropped from 39% in 2024 to just 26% a year later.

Housing, specifically the affordability of it, is a reoccurring issue in **Singapore**, the second-biggest loser in the index (from 9th down to 16th). But interestingly, results have somewhat improved in the Housing Subcategory (from 47th to 39th). The same can't be said for the rest of the index, though.

For example, the share of expats who agree it's easy to get a visa for Singapore has dropped by 10 percentage points, from 59% in 2024 to 49% in 2025. The country introduced several changes to

its visa system in 2024, including a ban on the use of employer of records to sponsor work permits.⁴
